The verses we have just considered strongly assert that the Bible is God's written word. It came to men from the Holy Spirit in an accurate and useful form, and they wrote it down accurately as it was revealed to them. It has also been accurately preserved and passed on to other generations and cannot be supplemented or replaced by natural or supernatural means. The Bible is a permanent and unchangeable record of God's actions and will. Efforts to alter it, supplement it, replace it, ignore it, or disobey it are condemned, even though the source of such efforts be someone who seems good or was formerly godly, or appears to be supernatural. God invites us to know Him through His own word, revealed and preserved by the Holy Spirit.

God has been pictured in the scriptures we've read as the one and only creator of everything, and the one and only God. He is shown to be lovingly interested in each of the people He has made, and a revealing God who has made both Himself and His plan known to human beings. He made all things good, and offers to redeem or save people from the consequences of their disobedience to Him. As creator He made all things good, and as redeemer He offers a new beginning to whoever will listen to Him and agree with His will.

However, as a righteous God His is also just, and will judge those who refuse His authority as their creator and His generosity as their redeemer. In listening to God and obeying His word, we find joyful life forever. In refusing His authority and generosity we find a fearful prospect of judgment and condemnation, forever. We must obey God, the all-wise creator, the loving redeemer, the righteous judge.

All trouble and human suffering is a result of sinful behavior, and as long as there is sin there will be suffering. God did not create a world of suffering, but man contaminated the good creation of God by rejecting His loving instruction and brought death and suffering into the world. In spite of man's continual rejection of His help and instruction, God has provided a way of overcoming sin through His own son's sacrificial death on the cross. We can have this answer for our own sins and guilt, not by some difficult and complicated process, but by responding in faith to God's command and Jesus' example of burial and resurrection through baptism and into new life.

D. God the creator's plan to save from sin preceded His creative work, has succeeded thus far, and will succeed.

The scriptures we have looked at have shown that God always had the plan revealed by His Son, Jesus, in mind, even when He began to create. There was no power of rebellion or lawlessness capable of preventing His success with His plan. The life, death, and resurrection of Jesus went just as God planned for them to go, and accomplished just what He wanted to accomplish. Today, Jesus Christ reigns over His kingdom from the right hand of God and Christians enjoy citizenship in that kingdom, as God promised in bygone days through His prophets and affirmed in these last days through His Son.

E. The unveiling of God's plan for man.

The assertion of the New Testament writers and preachers is that Jesus came in fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy. His perfect sinless life was the perfect sacrificial remedy for our sins, and he is now the perfect king and priest ruling and shepherding his people from the right hand of God, fulfilling the promise of a new king on David's throne. Salvation for us is found in the simple instructions delivered by Peter on the basis of convincing evidence that Jesus died and rose to reign. Like his crucifiers, we need to be convinced of the glory and power of Jesus Christ, and on the basis of that belief turn from our past conduct toward obedience to him, acknowledging his name and being baptized, so that God can give forgiveness and a new life through His Spirit.

F. God's eternal plan of salvation is still in effect and can save us too.

Have you responded to Jesus? Have you followed the pattern Jesus showed his disciples? If not, when will you do so? Believe in Jesus and confess his name. Turn from your former life with its sin and guilt and be baptized into Jesus so that your sins can be taken away and you can begin a new life of obedience to God the Father in His son, Jesus Christ. We will assist you now, or anytime, because we believe that as God has said, there will be a time when every knee will bow to Him. Let this be the time for you!
